METHODOLOGY

This probabilistic survey was conducted May 6 - 8, 2021, with 600 likely 2022 general election voters. It has a margin of error of $\pm 4.0\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones, SMS, and email invitation. This survey was weighted to likely general election voter universe.
