METHODOLOGY

This probabilistic survey was conducted June 17-20, 2021, with 600 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of $\pm 4.00\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones, SMS, and email invitation. This survey was weighted to a likely general election voter universe.
