### **METHODOLOGY**

This probabilistic survey was conducted January 21 - 23, 2022, with 600 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of  $\pm 3.95\%$ . Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones, SMS, and email invitation. This survey was weighted to likely general election voter universe.
