This probabilistic survey was conducted October 8 – 9, 2023, with 600 likely Republican primary election voters. It has a margin of error of  $\pm 3.88\%$ . Known registered voters were interviewed via live calls and SMS. This survey was weighted to a likely Republican primary election voter universe.
